





Chemistry


- Triple Chemistry students have been given a workbook from which their intervention work has been set (although this is also recommended to all students - just not checked)

Students also have knowledge organisers to revise vocab for all topics.


The conversation is worth 50% of this exam

- -Re-reading texts







Deliberate practice

set time aside to practice improving your I knowledge or geographical skills, choose what you need to do; it must be tough enough to challenge you and practice, practice, practice! You should focus on something you are almost able to do but not just yet!



How to use in geography



Use a model answer from your teacher. pull it apart and identify the key parts. Then answer a similar question and try to replicate. Study material, complete practice questions in timed conditions. Then use your note to correct/improve your answer. A week later redo a similar question. Repeat as necessary.

Students should complete the following types of activities as part of their revision:

Knowledge recall revision

Paper 1: Crime and Punishment in Britain 1000-present and Whitechapel depth study

Paper 2a: Early Elizabethan England, 1558-1888

3 Exam sittings, 4 exam papers:

- Paper 2b: Superpower relations and the Cold War, 1941-1991
- Paper 3: Weimar and Nazi Germany 1918-1939

Use your class notes, revision guides and BBC Bitesize History to create revision resources. For History, the best revision resources to recall key knowledge is:

- condensed notes,
- flash cards,

Once you have the bulk of the content written out you can then condense and organise further through:

- mind maps
- timelines

When you have created your resources, you will need to then do the following:

- cover them over and try to memorise them
- get someone at home to test you on the key knowledge
- rewrite them out again try and do as much as you can from memory then add the missing content in [perhaps using a different colour]

Application of knowledge

- Whilst creating revision resources is a vital part of revision, exam questions are opportunities for you to **apply** your knowledge in the way in which you will need to in the exam itself.
- Decoding exam questions what are the command words, what is the knowledge focus, what are the time periods in the question?
- Planning exam questions you might not fully complete every past paper question, and this is okay as long as you plan out answers to questions, and don't avoid questions!
- **Complete past paper questions** this could be going back over ones covered in class, using the booklets on Sharepoint, past papers given out in lessons, or the exam questions in the revision guides. Students can and should bring these into school for teacher feedback.



Revision in RS over the Easter Holidays



At this stage all students should be at points 2 and 3 (RS content is now finished-there is nothing new to learn).

Year 11 Computer Science and Creative Media Easter Support

Computer science

- All pupils have revision books to work through all the exam topics.
- Pupils have been given Past Papers to complete over Easter
- Exam questions are also available on SharePoint
- All resources are available on sharepoint

Creative Media

- Revision books have been supplied for the Theory unit of Creative media.
- Pupils have been guided to work through this and make notes on all the topics, practicing by completing the questions and self marking the work.

Drama Revision

- Exam: 9th May (first day of exams)
- Students have been given a homework booklet which is also available on Teams. The booklet covers exam techniques, key content, mock questions and helps students to identify areas of revision to focus on. Students need to complete all tasks in the booklet.
- The final deadline for coursework is Monday 15th April. This component is worth 40% of their GCSE. All students have received feedback. The total word count is 2500 words. Students may email KTH over Easter with any questions to ensure the deadline is met. There are PPT'S on Teams to support students with this task.
- Students have been directed on Teams on where to find links for past papers. A useful revision task is for students to answer the questions under the time constraints of the exam to best prepare them. Students may send practice papers to KTH for feedback.
- Students can watch the whole recording of Blood Brothers on Youtube to remind themselves of the plot. This will help prepare students for the exam as they will be given an unseen extract. If possible, students can rent/buy Billy Elliot: The Musical from Amazon to remind themselves of the key scenes.

- The department opens most days at lunch time to support pupils with their coursework by arrangement with the teacher.
- We also open at least one night a week to enable pupils to get some one-to-one teacher support and quality time to complete work. This is also when our formal interventions will take place.
- Photo editing takes time and needs to be done on Photoshop in school. If you don't have Photoshop at home 'Photopea' is a good online free version of photoshop.
- Coursework (Component 1) deadline is end of term 1. This is worth 60% of the overall grade. It is important that pupils meet this deadline with work set by the teacher.
- The photography exam (Component 2) takes three months to complete. The paper comes out in January and your child will be working on this until April. There is a ten hour exam at the end but everything that they do over the three months counts towards the exam unit which is worth 40% of the overall grade.

Encouraging them to act on feedback to help them to achieve the highest standard of work as possible


Encouraging them to attend at lunch time or after school. (They are welcome to bring a packed lunch!)

Secondary sources: the work of other sociologists

No perspective. Very positive about family diversity

In the 1980s, they identified 5 different types of diversity within families: Cultural, Cohort, Class, Organisational, and Life course. EG. If a family is working class, they may have different values and structures than a middle class family who may be able to afford more support.

Robert Chester thinks they exaggerate the extent of family diversity, for most the nuclear family is still dominant and aspirational.



Use the video links, your textbook, revision guide and your exercise books to complete the three sections.

Use knowledge organisers to create you own 2-mark questions. These questions require two sentences, should include the word 'because' and only test knowledge. The are usually definition questions. The glossary of terms on Bloodle will be of help.

Use the CGP workbooks to test yourself. Do questions on each topic and then use the answers to MIB your work. Use the activity to focus your revision on the topic you know the least about.



Use the knowledge organisers to pick out the links between topics. Both 12-mark questions require you do this. A mind map is a good tool with which to complete this activity.

Use the Zig Zag papers. Past groups report that these are more difficult than the actual exam. Mark them using the mark scheme and MIB. See your teacher if something doesn't make sense.






